How to use the Fair Market Value list

Agricorp will use fair market values (FMV) to value your crop and livestock inventory, as long as the values are reasonable for your farming operation.

To use a different FMV

To use a different FMV, you must provide a receipt for sales or purchases that occurred within 30 days of your year-end. You must also explain why the FMV on this list is not reasonable for your operation (e.g., the FMV category does not reflect your inventory, your marketing channel or method is different).

If an FMV is not on this list

You can use your own FMV if you provide sales or purchase invoices showing the correct value. For purchased input inventory (e.g. seed, purchased feed, fertilizer), use the actual purchase cost of your inventory.

If you have an off-calendar year-end

Use the FMV for the last month of your farm's fiscal year-end. For example, if your fiscal year ends on March 31, use the FMV for March.
